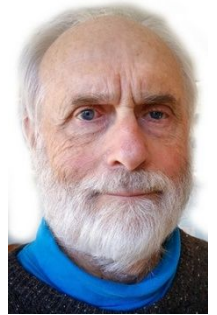

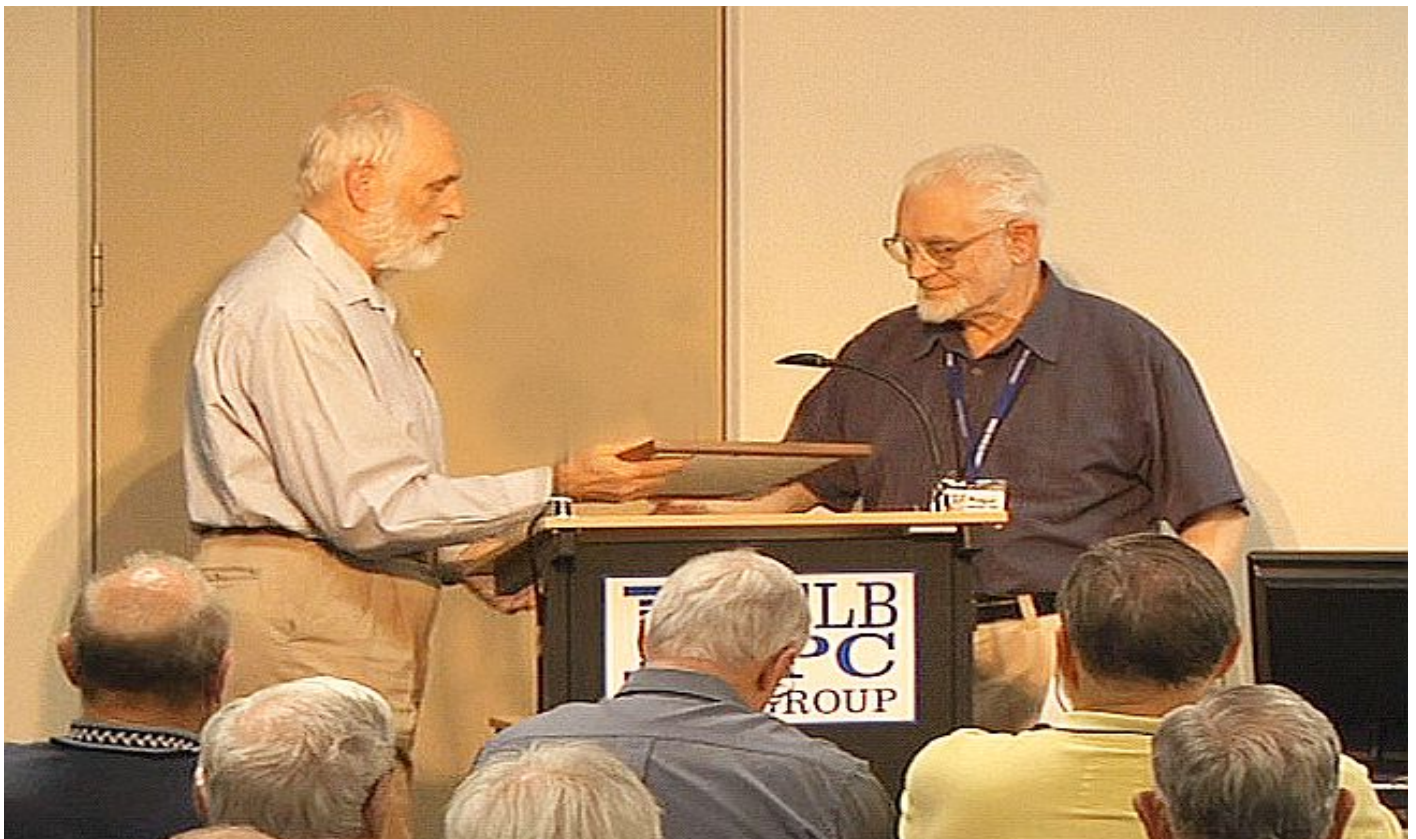
Roger spent two years 2011-2013 editing PC Update.

RANSOMWARE

Protecting your ability to recover from an attack

A recent posting to Yahoo.com reminded me that the key element to recovering from a ransomware attack is to have a reliable system image backup. Most computer users — you among them, I'm sure — are aware of this and have diligently performed regular backups. Some may have chosen to back up their systems to a Cloud-based service for which, if their backup files are sufficiently large, they pay a monthly fee based on the storage capacity required. Others have preferred to keep things "close to the vest" and store their backup files on a local external hard-drive (never, ever store backup files on an internal hard drive) for which one with a three-terabyte capacity, for example, presently costs about \$100.

I fall into the latter group.

Cost aside, both methods provide protection but also have their own particular drawbacks that are too often overlooked. What will happen, for instance, if some enterprising ransomware purveyor one day successfully manages to hijack (encrypt) all the client files that have been stored with the cloud-based service. Not possible, such services say. Well, that may be but just how sure of that are you really — or are they, for that matter? And, as sure as God made little green apples, you can bet that there is at least one someone somewhere trying to do just that.

The uncertainty of cloud-based services is what led me to rely on a USB-connected external hard-drive for storing my backup files; and I have been doing so for years with a blissful — and perhaps a false — sense of confidence that they would be secure and uncorrupted should they be needed. Ok, so what's the drawback in this method? The fact is that a ransomware attack will — along with all files stored on the internal hard-drives — also hijack the backup files stored on an external hard-drive unless the drive is either powered off or physically disconnected from

the computer at the time of the attack. Not a problem, said I - my USB 3.0 external hard-drive is equipped with an On-Off switch and I power it ON only for the time it takes to create a backup.

There's one other precaution I take and that's to set my cable modem to "Stand by" mode to disrupt Internet traffic during the time that a backup is created; thereby assuring that my system and external hard drives will not be vulnerable to attack while a backup is in progress.

Accordingly, I considered the risk of the backup files becoming corrupted was minimal. And all was fine and dandy until I decided to swap a relatively low-capacity external hard-drive over to my laptop PC and to install two larger capacity USB 3.0 hard-drives on the desktop PC. The problem with doing this was that the newer drives did not have On-Off switches; and rummaging around behind my desktop PC (which, despite what it's called, is actually located under a desk) to connect and disconnect the USB cables from either the drives themselves or the PC was a real pain — it's a rats-nest back there, as many will probably know.

My solution: I purchased a powered 4-port USB 3.0 hub (under \$20) specifically for use with the two newly installed external hard-drives. Now, all I have to do is connect/disconnect the one cable between the hub and the PC. Fortunately, a USB 3.0 port on the front of my PC that makes this convenient and easy. The only thing I need to be careful of is making sure that the external hard-drives have both completed their respective operations before disconnecting the hub from the PC which, by the way, also removes power to the drives (i.e., acts as a defacto power On-Off switch).

Of course, if you use just one external hard-drive to store your backup files, and it has an accessible On-Off switch, you've no problem. Even if the drive doesn't have an ON-Off switch it's likely that restricting Internet access to it will be simply a matter of disconnecting the USB cable from the back of the device and that should not be much of a problem either.

Why do I have two external hard-drives? One is used to directly store backup files — which by the way, are always full system image backups — as they are created. The other serves to archive copies of previously created backups; that is, to back up my backups.

OK, so I'm paranoid when it comes to protecting my system image backups — it's not the worst of my faults. Admittedly, over the past 25 years or so, I can recall only once having to restore a system from a backup. I consider myself lucky on that score. But, with the chance of suffering a malicious attack rapidly increasing at the rate at which it is in today's world — and the risk will only get worse with time — I'd rather be overly cautious than suffer the consequences that could result from a lack of vigilance.

Voice Control: HEY CORTANA, OK GOOGLE, SIRI & ALEXA

Remember Dragon Naturally Speaking? It was, and still is, Voice Recognition software mostly used to control the operation of a word processor like Word. Certain words were used for very specific manipulation of the cursor and the text. Naturally Speaking came on the scene and became useful sometime around 1999 to 2003, depending on how much you needed to transcribe documents into the computer. Early versions had to be “trained” by the user to recognise their individual voice, and the speed and accuracy were sometimes acceptable, and sometimes not so much. Things have really improved since then; now the manufacturer, Nuance, claims in its advertising that “Dragon is 3x faster than typing and it’s 99% accurate”. So, Voice Recognition software has really come a long way.

(For those of you, who are not familiar with Naturally Speaking, it has three primary areas of functionality: dictation, text-to-speech, and command input. The user is able to dictate and have their speech transcribed as written text, or they can have a document synthesized as an audio stream, or they can issue commands that are recognised by the program.)

Naturally Speaking is an example of a local computer application or App. All the computing needed for it to operate is on the computer that runs it. Naturally Speaking doesn’t take advantage of Client-Server technology. If you attended one of our classes, you will recall that when an application is implemented with Client-Server technology, the heavy lifting (computer processing) is not done locally, but rather at a Server that is very powerful and very fast, but remote from the Client. The remote Server is connected to the Client by the internet, which allows rapid movement of data between the Client and the Server. So the Client App runs on the local computer and is connected to the Server Software, running in the cloud, via the internet. This combination provides the total Voice Recognition & Control System. The client collects input from the user and sends it to the Server where all the really complex computing is accomplished. The Server analyses the input and develops the responses and sends them to the Client where the results are presented to the user in audio and/or display formats.

Naturally Speaking is certainly a useful product, but the voice recognition and control that has really gotten the attention of the public lately, are the intelligent personal assistants that are provided by some of the leading computer companies, Apple, Microsoft, Google, and Amazon. Apple was first on the scene with “Siri”, followed by Google’s “Ok Google”, then, with Windows 10, came Microsoft’s “Hey Cortana”, and finally Amazon’s “Alexa”.

All of these are Client-Server implementations. The Servers are somewhere in the cloud and the Client resides on your smartphone, in the case of Siri and “OK Google”, or on your laptop (or desktop, or tablet) in the case of “Hey Cortana”, or on a special device that is placed centrally located in your home, in the case of “Alexa”.

All of these assistants use a Natural Language User Interface to answer questions. You’ll need a microphone on your device to take advantage of this capability. The Client app, on the device, uses the microphone to listen for a “Wake Phrase”. After this phrase is recognised, the following intercepted speech is then sent to the Server where it is analysed via speech recognition software, and converted to commands. The Server then uses these commands to gather answers to the original spoken inquiry. All of these assistants can make recommendations and perform various actions via their Server capabilities. (For example, a verbal request for the “weather” might yield various audible statements about the weather in your location. Or, a request for “traffic” might yield audible indications of the traffic in your location, or possibly maps indicating traffic problems. Or, a request for the best restaurant might yield a list of restaurants near your location. Or, if you have things set up, the statement “Add eggs to my shopping list” will yield an updated shopping list including eggs.)

Here are some descriptions (and advertisements) found for each of these Voice Recognition & Control Apps.

- Siri (Speech Interpretation and Recognition Interface) is a computer program that works as an “intelligent personal assistant” and “knowledge navigator”, according to Wikipedia. “The software adapts to the user’s individual language usage and individual searches with continuing use, and ns results that are individualised”, also from Wikipedia.

“Hey Siri” is the wake phrase, which can be turned on or off.

- OK Google lets you do things like search, get directions, and create reminders. For example “OK Google do I need an umbrella” to see if there is rain in the weather forecast. To use “OK Google”, make sure you have the latest Google Search App and turn on “OK Google detection” in settings.
- Cortana is an App with which you can use your voice to make a call, send a text message, search the web, or open another App. Cortana can help you: schedule a meeting, set a reminder, get up-to-date weather or traffic. (Note: you need a Microsoft account to use Cortana.) “Hey Cortana” seems to be tied to the “Notebook”, and thus is setup in the Notebook-Settings, which may not be obvious. (You get to the Notebook-Settings by clicking in the search bar on the Taskbar, then selecting Notebook [the square icon under the home icon], and finally Settings.)
- Alexa is the name of Amazon’s assistant that comes with the Amazon Echo. Echo is a wireless speaker and voice command device. The device consists of a 9.25-inch tall cylinder

speaker with a seven-piece microphone array. “Alexa”, the “wake word” is always on and can be changed by the user to either “Amazon” or “Echo”. The device is capable of voice interaction, music playback, making to-do lists, setting alarms, streaming podcasts, playing audio books, and providing weather, traffic and other real time information. It can also control several smart devices. Echo requires a Wi-Fi internet connection in order to work. The Echo must be plugged in to operate since it has no internal battery.

If these personal digital assistants are successful, many more may show up. I just read that the company that brought us the SoundHound App also has a personal assistant called Hound that they hope to embed in other applications so that those Apps can be voice controlled. Imagine setting up an Uber ride by voice. (If you will recall, SoundHound is like the Shazam App, just hum a tune and it will tell you the tune’s name.) With all these personal assistants around, we certainly will never have to feel lonely.

Search Engines – Google

Google is the dominant search engine. Several of the original players have dropped out. There are also various specialist sites.

Early search engines just sorted web pages based on the content of the title page. In other words they could be just a large indexing service. With Google, the key strategy is to give priority to sites that are targeted by links in numerous other sites. The other key point about Google is that it bores into the content of web pages and does not just rely on the content of the title page. That is why you can use quotation marks in Google to pick up plagiarism in specific phrases. The size of the Google data base is no longer published but it must be colossal.

The Google home page is designed to be uncluttered. You type in a topic, hit search (or

Enter) and in less than about a second you have thousands, or hundreds of thousands of sorted potential responses.

Here are some points to note:

If you have a main topic and sub topics, put the main subject first. Try and think the way Google operates in presenting the response.

- Ignore capitalisation. You can use all lower case to save time. Google ignores punctuation and words like **the** or **a**.
- Avoid a query in question form. There is a search engine called Ask which has a mixed reputation
- If there are sub topics, Google implies an “and” between each topic. For example if you entered beach brighton. Google would search for millions of entries with the word beach. Then it would pick out entries which also had

the word brighton. If you had not marked search Australian entries you would have Brighton England. The main point is that you would have entries that had beach in one place and Brighton elsewhere in the same paragraph or a following page.

- If you wanted entries with Brighton beach you would need to enter "Brighton Beach" in inverted double commas. When you are looking for an exact phrase you need to pay attention to punctuation and capitalisation. If you wanted to know which Shakespearean play had the words "to be or not to be" Google would find an instant answer. This is all because Google bores down into the content of a page. Not all search engines do that. This ability to pick up phrases is, as mentioned, a way of finding plagiarism.
- If you want "and", add AND in upper case with a space on each side.
- If you want to exclude a word from the response put NOT in upper case, with a space on each side, before the word. An alternative is to put a minus sign against the word.
- If you want one or more alternative words put an OR in upper case before each such word.
- If you want similar words to be included in the search, put a tilde ~ in front of such a word with no space.
- Generally ignore paid responses. Across the top, or down the right hand side you may see a reference to sponsored links. These have not been retrieved on merit but because of a payment for advertising. The Australian Consumer and Competition Commission considers that such entries should be properly labelled advertisements.
- Dangerous sites. The free McAfee Site Advisor could mark a caution about a web site. Norton Symantec 360 Premium (not free) is excellent at picking up dangerous sites. It also has a built in firewall.

- Free scans. This may 'find' a problem which was inserted. The "problem" can be "fixed" by purchasing a program. This suggests a scam.

Advanced Search

Type 'advanced search' in Google and you get linked to a specialised input form.

This is a way of better targeting a search by getting fewer unwanted results. It avoids having to enter "AND" or "OR" or "NOT". You can also search for a phrase.

You can select to have 10, 20 or 50 results per page.

You can select to have only results in English, if your French or Spanish is rusty. This choice could slightly speed up searches and eliminate incomprehensible results.

You can specify which type of site to select for a search. For example if it is a medical topic be cautious about some com sites. Specify site:edu and you will get university medical schools. That command eg site:au also works in the home page.

A date range can get you news items going back say one month, one year etc.

Other Facilities

Conversions This covers currency, metric and other measures.

For example 65 USD to AUD gives an instant result. The question can be put in several ways and still work.

If a car engine is say 140KW and you want a figure as brake horse power just enter 140 KW as bhp.

Time. To get the time in Perth, just enter - time perth

Definitions. Just enter define: and a word or phrase. Have no space after the colon.

Links. Link: plus a www web address will tell you which sites have links to that address.

Related: plus a www address will pull out related sites.

Other Google Sites

There are several specialised Google sites. Two of the best that are worth bookmarking are.

Google Street View. Use this if you are planning to visit a new destination or if you are curious about any location in Australia or overseas.

Google News. This gives a wider coverage than ABC News, SBS News or BBC News. There are other national versions eg. NZ Google News which has a major Australian content plus international news.

Other Browsers

Bing. This is good on videos. It is owned by Microsoft.

East SIG Report – February 2017

The meeting commenced with **Paul Woolard** welcomed members to this the first meeting for 2017. Q&A conducted by President **George Skarbek** then followed.

Q: I have a number of small programs that do not have an installation file, but are run simply by clicking on a shortcut from the programs exe file. As there isn't an installation file, these programs do not get listed in the alphabetical "All Apps" menu. I can right click on the exe file and send a link to the Taskbar or the Start Menu, but these actions do not add the program to the "All Apps" menu. How can I add these exe programs to the "All Apps" menu?

A: You will need to add these exe programs manually. Create a short cut and copy the shortcut to the C:\ProgramData\Microsoft\Windows\StartMenu\Programs folder.

Q: I have a WD media player that shows 3 PCs on my network but not a fourth, an ASUS T100. The T100 shows up in devices and I can ping it. However it is not showing up on the network. Can you suggest a solution?

A: Pinging should find discoverable machines on the network. You could try disabling the firewall and see if that has any effect. If it does, you can tell the firewall to add an exception. However the firewall should know that the T100 is downstream of the router and not block it. It could be the network name is not the same for all devices so that is something worth checking.

Q: I have a laptop running Windows 8.1 which is set to automatically download Windows updates. Last September it failed to install updates and I have been trying to do this manually ever since without success. When I click the "Check for Updates" button, the computer starts on the "Looking for Updates" screen and sits there for hours without ever finishing. Google shows that it's not an uncommon problem but there doesn't seem to be a solution. Can you suggest a solution?

A: You are correct, this is not an uncommon problem. The first thing to do is to look at the updates history and stroll through the updates and see if any have failed. If one update has failed, Windows updates may be trying to download the same file and it keeps on failing. Tell Windows to ignore the failed file and Updates may then get past that file. If that fails try using the "Windows Update Troubleshooter"

Q: I've found that my Windows 10 machines can't see Windows XP machines on my network. The Windows 10 machines can see all other machines but for some reason couldn't see XP machines.

A: I recycle old PCs to give to needy groups and have not had any trouble like you describe. On my network my Windows 10 machine can see Windows XP machines and vice-versa, so I don't

think your problem is a blanket issue with Windows 10. It could be your antivirus or firewall that is preventing you seeing the Windows XP machines so try switching them off.

Q: Recently while on a trip an SD card failed. When I returned home I tried to recover the data on the card without success. Is there any way to fix the SD card?

A: There is likely to be no easy fix to your problem. Possible causes are a corruption on the SD card, the file system could be missing, the controller on the SD card may have failed or possibly someone deleted the files, although the latter is less likely. If the directory is scrambled, all the files are still on the SD card but the pointers are incorrect. If this is the case it's worth trying a free undelete program to recover your data. You will find some very good undelete programs on Gizmo's Freeware site <http://www.techsupportalert.com> that would be worth trying. That is the only easy option to this problem. Failing that you can go to a data recovery service but these will be very expensive. There will normally be a nominal charge to give a prognosis before full payment is required. If the controller on the SD has failed it is not fixable but the data is recoverable at a cost.

After Q&A the next presentation was "**What to consider when buying a new PC**" by **George Skarbek**. Upgraders should first ask themselves, why do I need a new PC, what doesn't my old PC do that I need and should I buy a laptop or desktop.

An old computer can be sped up by stopping unwanted programs from loading automatically on start-up, as these programs take up valuable memory. George suggested Acrobat Reader, QuickTime, programs that adjust audio and graphic card settings are some of the programs he stops from loading automatically. Stopping them loading automatically doesn't delete them as they can be run later when needed. George went on to outline how this is done in the various versions of Windows. When these unwanted programs update, they will most likely reappear at Start up so will have to be removed again. A fresh reinstall of Windows will also give an old PC a significant boost as it removes unused programs that build up over time. If you use these tips you may be able to prolong the life of your old PC.

If you rarely need the portability of a laptop, a desktop PC will give you more "bang for your buck" and it will also be upgradable. You can also save money by using your existing keyboard, mouse and monitor.

George outlined the major components (CPU, RAM & HDD) to be considered when buying a new PC. Depending on what the PC is used for will determine the specifications of the components you need. George then went on to recommend the specifications for each of these components for a user who has minimal computing demands such as using email and internet browsing through to a user who might need multiple complex programs open simultaneously or for serious video rendering.

George noted that the first item to consider before all else for a fast machine, is to use a Solid State Drive (SSD). This is followed by the selection of the CPU. George recommends Intel CPU's at present but check the generation of the CPU as some advertising may try to sell older generation chips as current model computers.

After a short break **Stuart Bedford** spoke on "**Using social media, the internet and Australian Consumer Australian to enforce your legal rights**". Stuart gave another very informative presentation, some of which I have copied from below. The key issues discussed were, know your consumer rights (refer <http://www.consumer.vic.gov.au>) and what to do when companies do not understand Consumer Law and will try to bluff you either deliberately, out of ignorance or even plain arrogance.

Australian consumer law states:

1. You have the right to ask for a repair, replacement or refund under the Australian Consumer Law consumer guarantees for products and services bought on or after 1st January 2011.
2. Your rights under the consumer guarantees do not have a specific expiry date and can apply even after any warranties you've got from a business have expired.
3. It is against the law for businesses to tell you or show signs stating that they do not give refunds under any circumstances, including for gifts and during sales.
4. You are entitled to return a product if you believe that there is a problem.
5. You are generally responsible for returning the product if it can be posted or easily returned. You are entitled to recover reasonable postage or transportation costs from the business if the product is confirmed to have a problem, so keep your receipts.
6. The retailer who sold you the product or service cannot refuse to help you by sending you to the

manufacturer or importer. You can approach the manufacturer or importer directly, however, you will only be entitled to recover costs from them, which include an amount for reduction in the product's value and in some cases compensation for damages or loss.

7. You cannot demand a repair, replacement or refund from the manufacturer.

It is essential that you keep receipts. Stuart uses a Smart Phone app called ScanBot to record all his receipts which are stored on the phone and in the cloud.

A lot of discussion followed on the statistics shown in the report and the long term future of the organisation. Members were invited to submit to the committee any suggestions they may have to overcome the decline and forward a copy to our meeting email, so that we may all discuss. The importance of Yammer as the main source of information was stressed, as many members at Essendon do not avail themselves of Office365 and Yammer. A segment of Question and Answers rounded out the morning.

During our meeting we discussed

1. We wanted to automatically adjust stock quantity when creating an invoice.

The agreed solution was to use the code MsgBox to ask the user if they wanted to save the invoice. Clicking Yes triggers an update query that reduces the quantity based on a cell, containing the sold quantity, on the invoice form.

The stock table has a quantity of 15.
The invoice form is selling a quantity of 3.
The update query obtains the quantity in the table and subtracts the quantity on the form.
The result is submitted to the table.

2. Lotus 123 files are used in a small business and there is a restriction in Lotus of one user in a file at a time. We suggested investigating free, online CRM (Customer Relations Management) software due to the age of Lotus. Excel stopped opening Lotus 123 files in approximately 2003.

3. A small corruption event removed a criterion from a Select Query, resulting in wrong data in the query flowing through the database. Remember to backup :-).

Investment Tools – WASINT – (Web and Software investment Tools)

The February meeting reviewed investment categories used by small investors in the period for the 2016 calendar year to the present. Most categories experienced positive returns in this time. Discussion was focused on the Australian stock market (ASX) as this offers the most flexible opportunity for smaller investors. Stocks (shares) in the ASX may be placed in broad sections based on their principal activity. A good means to consider

sector performance is to use charting tools to display the price as a function of time as outcome is not dependent on single starting and end dates and a longer time view is obtained. Many online and desktop charting programs offer the ability to plot the performance of a number of sectors on the same graph.

A “Performance graph” for a number of sectors is shown in the Figure with this article. As a reference, the Australian “All Ordinaries index), shown in brown in the Figure, had a better than 10% gain depending on your specific starting and end date. The best performing sector was the gold sector. The graph for the gold sector prices is similar in shape to that for the international price of gold over this period. At current prices, a number of ASX gold producers have positive cash returns as shown in company reports. Among gold producing companies with good economic health are Newcrest Mining (NCM), Regis Resources (RRL), St Barbara (SBM) and Resolute Mining (RSG). All had much better than 100% price gain in the early part of 2016, following by a significant price drop as shown by the gold line in the Figure. 2017 has seen a significant recovery from this drop in the price of gold stocks. As seen in the Figure, gold is a particular volatile sector.

The “Materials Sector” as shown by the red line in the Figure experienced a good steady price gain over the 2016-2017 period. This section includes BHP Billiton (BHP) and Rio Tinto (RIO), both of which had better than 50% gains. Increases in the international prices for iron ore and coal contributed to these gains. Iron ore producers such as Fortescue Metals (FMG) had a better than 300% gain over the period. The price of FMG is much more closely related to the price of iron ore than BHP and RIO. Mining services companies such as Downer EDI (DOW) also performed well over the period with better than 50% price increases.

Price variation in the more conservative Financial Services Sector (including major banks) was less variable. As seen by the blue line in the graph, this sector under performed the All Ordinaries index (brown line) until November 2016 and then the relative performance improved from November to the current. For a conservative section, the increase in price has approached 20% in the November 2016 – February 2017 time frame, which is a very good annualised return.

Finally for this discussion there is the Telecommunications Sector (green line in the Figure) which had a dismal period price wise. This sector includes Telstra (TLS), TPG Telecom (TPM) and

Vocus (VOC) all with price falls. over the reference period. The latter two had price falls greater than 50% from highs in the period. Simple maths indicates that to recover from a 50% fall in price, a 100% gain in price is required. Volatility is becoming an increasing feature of all stock markets.

Of interest at this time to discuss at future meetings is whether the current upward momentum in the Gold, and Materials Sectors (and to a lesser extent the major Banks) is continuing.

new Panasonic GH5, which he called the camera which best combines video and stills.

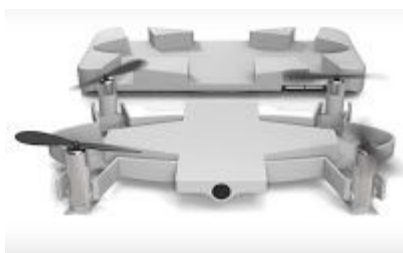

John Hall followed with a demonstration on using the Mercalli and ProDrenalin post-production image stabilising applications.



Richard Balsillie explained how he had been using a Rode Smartlav microphone connected to an Apple iPhone to record interviews. This worked well, but was fiddly to set up, and required downloading separate files and syncing with the video footage. With the use of a Rode shielded cable (Rode SC8) and a TRRS (Apple standard 3.5mm connector) to (the more widely used) TRS adapter (Rode SC3), he now connects the microphone directly to the camera. This he finds is a much quicker and easier method, both in the field, and in post. He added that the three items cost less than \$100 in total.

He also added that with a second Smartlav and a two-into-one adapter (Rode SC6), he can record a two-way conversation very easily.

Richard then showed some footage taken by a Samsung SC7 smartphone, demonstrating how far smartphone video had come in recent years.

Plan B looks like 'fire-sale mode' to me but could be inevitable.

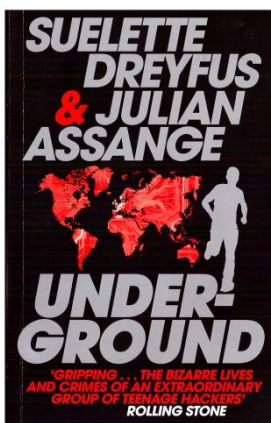
My favorites are the SIGS ... I organized one for a few years in Shepparton ... it was enjoyable but you do get tired in the end!

Book Reviews

'Underground' by Suelette Dreyfus & Julian Assange. Rolling Stone described it thus: 'Gripping ... The bizarre lives and crimes of an extraordinary group of teenage hackers'.

My copy, 2011 edition ~ \$22.70 posted from Book Depository.

I read most of this story as a 'pirated edition' off bulletin boards (forerunner of the Internet) about 20 years ago. Rereading this updated

edition, I rate it as one of the few books that did not put me to sleep late at night.

It is the chronicle of young people with names like 'Mendax' 'Electron' and 'Phoenix' who played games on the international computer network, teasing 'system administrators' of communication networks like Telecom, NASA and the US Department of Defence in the late 1980's and early '90s.

They were 'self-taught computer operator's and well skilled at the 'games' they played. It was an 'addictive game' and they became victims of it, and they also aroused the ire of the Computer Crimes Unit of the Australian Federal Police and the FBI and other international crime fighting units. Pretty scary when the 'hackers' knew exposure was inevitable ... better

to read this book for yourself and enjoy the thrill of the chase.

In the early days of computing, systems were expensive and extremely primitive by today's standards. Modems were slow so the 'hackers' had to spend hours, often long sleepless nights, to satisfy their addiction that finally ended in the courts.

Suelette Dreyfus and her co-author, WikiLeaks founder Julian Assange, tell the extraordinary true story of the computer underground, and the elite ring of international hackers who took on the establishment.

It is good to be reminded that the origins were a youthful curiosity that was more about adventure than serious crime. Now we live in a world of electronic strip searches at airports and government-sponsored cyber wars with publishers and nations alike. The early computer underground was where it all began.

Random Access

John Swale reports on Questions and Answers from the opening session of the February monthly meeting and from members' written submissions.

Questions and Answers

Q: What do you recommend for measuring my ADSL internet speed? I want to be able to compare it to the NBN speed when it comes.

A: If you search for "internet speed test" you will come up with several alternatives. You should run the test several times during the day. It will be slower when the kids get home from school and be faster at 3:00 am. Try using different servers to see the difference between Melbourne, Sydney and USA servers. Most members use "speedtest.net" and work off a local Melbourne server. Also, consider where most of the content you are going to access comes from. Another factor is what the other end is doing. If a site is popular it may restrict the speed because it does not have the capacity to provide maximum speed to everyone. In some cases, with popular downloads, the local server may cache the content, e.g. Microsoft or antivirus updates, so they don't have to keep downloading them. You will notice a significant increase in upload speed. When NBN comes remember to haggle with your supplier and

one or two others and you will get a much better deal than the initial offer.

Q: I have a Windows PC that has not done automatic updates for three months. When I run it manually, it checks for updates and stays for hours without doing anything. A search showed it was not an uncommon problem. The answers were very complicated and I would like a simple solution.

A: Let it run overnight and it may correct itself in the morning. If not, check what it is trying to update. If one item has failed, stop it from downloading again. You can download a Windows update trouble shooter that may help. It checks for any obvious problems on your PC such as a corrupted update file. A member found a solution was to turn off updates, turn the PC off, then on again and turn on automatic updates.

Q: I have a six month old computer with 16 GB ram and an SSD with very few programs installed. It operates for about an hour then freezes. Ctl-Alt-Del does not fix it. Do you have any ideas?

A: Check the event viewer (Control panel > Administrative tasks > Event viewer) and check the System and Applications areas. Also, check Task Manager > Performance > Resource monitor and see what is loading up the CPU or hard disk. Then find what application is causing the problem. Some

updates require GBs of space and will cause the PC to hang if there is not enough room. If the hard disk is

short of room run CCleaner and disk clean up and then remove all but the last Restore Point.

C. Description of Service(s)

General:

Melbourne PC User Group Inc. A0003293V (Melb PC) Internet Service network (the Network) is a service owned and operated by Melb PC for its members. It is a subscriber-funded service administered by the Internet Management Subcommittee (the subcommittee).

Function of the Melb PC Network: The primary function of the Network is to support the transfer of information to and from Melb PC members and the international community, subject to the terms of this agreement.

Access Software: The subscriber will need to acquire suitable mail, news and Web software from our shareware library or other resources. However, Melb PC makes available a configuration kit that automates this process for those who require it.

Accounts: Accounts are issued only to individuals, not company names; Melb PC may reject an application without stating a reason.

Support: Volunteers offer their help in local newsgroups and via an Internet Help team with interaction through Web Boards, e-mail and direct telephone support.

Duration: The subscription to the Network is for one year from the date of acceptance. It automatically terminates upon expiry of membership of MelbPC if that occurs earlier.

Acknowledgment: Successful applicants will include individuals whose forms are correctly filled out and whose funds have been transferred to the Melb PC Bank account.

Net Etiquette: Melb PC endorses adherence to ("Net etiquette" or "Netiquette") as deemed by the subcommittee from time to time and to prevailing international standards widely accepted as suitable behavior for using the Internet.

D. Terms of Agreement

- The subscriber asks Melb PC to provide a level of Internet access and Melb PC agrees to do so.
- This agreement starts when an authorized officer of Melb PC has executed it and Melb PC has received a cleared payment for the subscription period.
- If the subscriber renews this agreement for a further subscription period, this agreement applies to the renewed subscription period unless the parties agree otherwise in writing.
- The subscriber acknowledges that:
 - Continuity and speed of the Internet access depends on a wide range of factors many of which are beyond the control of Melb PC.
 - Melb PC has no control over the accuracy of appropriateness of any information on the Internet.
 - Melb PC is not responsible for any material available on the Internet.
 - The subscriber's Internet access may be interrupted by equipment failure, the need for routine maintenance peak demand and so on.
 - Melb PC cannot guarantee that the subscriber will be able to secure access at any given time or that fluctuations in demand by other subscribers will not prevent the subscriber from using the full amount of the maximum daily time allowance on any given day.
 - Melb PC cannot guarantee that subscriber's home pages will always be available.
 - Dial up and Mobile Broadband Internet Subscribers are responsible for writing and uploading their own home pages and keeping backup copies of same. Melb PC does not back up these home pages. Subscribers will need to reload their own home pages in the event that the Melb PC facilities suffer any data loss.
 - The right to publish and communicate using home pages is granted to full Internet subscribers in the spirit of user group activities of sharing and furthering the computing experience. The quality of the Melb PC Internet service will be protected by Melb PC reserving its right to suspend the access to any publications of a subscriber who generates a disproportionate amount of Internet traffic. Subject to matters of the kind referred to in the previous clause and to the subscriber's access limits, Melb PC will use its best endeavours to keep Internet access available continuously and to allow the subscriber to have access for the current daily time allowance as set from time to time.
- The subscriber will indemnify Melb PC against any liability, claim, action, suit, demand, loss, cost or expense arising out of or in any way connected with this agreement or Internet access, including without limitation any negligence by Melb PC, its servants or agents.
- The subscriber will pay fees according to Melb PC's standard pricing list from time to time, and a copy of the list certified by an officer of Melb PC is conclusive evidence of the prices applicable at any time.
- Any notice given about any matter concerning this agreement may be given by clicking an accept button following the display of the agreement on a web page, by fax, e-mail or post at the last fax number email or postal address notified to the sender and is deemed to have been received at the time when it would have arrived in the ordinary course of the relevant type of transmission.
- Melb PC may change any term of this Agreement or make additional rules at any time by means of notification delivered in accordance with clause 9. Subscriber may refuse to accept any such change and terminate or her Internet access and receive a pro-rata refund for any paid subscription if a request to this effect is received within 14 days from the deemed receipt date of a notice of changes. Should a subscriber continue to keep using the service past the date of the notice deemed received as described in clause 9, the subscriber shall be deemed to accept the changes. A copy of the rules certified by an officer of Melb PC is conclusive evidence of the rules applicable at any time. The rules from time to time will apply as if they were set out in full as terms of this agreement.
- The subscriber must not deliberately or recklessly do anything that damages Melb PC's equipment, software, setup or services.
- The subscriber must not use Internet access to annoy, harass or harm other Internet users including sending of viruses either wittingly or unwittingly and the sending of spam or unsolicited bulk email.
- The subscriber must not use Internet access for any unlawful purpose or in any unlawful manner.
- Melb PC does not review any publications or communication and does not verify, endorse, or otherwise take responsibility for the content of same.
- Subscribers are legally responsible for their own publications and communications.
- The subscriber will keep safe and confidential any access numbers; codes or passwords allotted to them by Melb PC and notify Melb PC without delay of any compromise of that information.
- Melb PC may suspend or terminate the subscribers Internet access immediately if the subscriber breaches this agreement wittingly or unwittingly or fails to promptly pay any money owed to Melb PC or ceases to be a member of Melb PC.
- Melb PC may delete without notice any material found on its storage disks without giving any reason for doing so.
- Melb PC may make and keep any record it requires for the purpose of this agreement or the rules or for the operation of its services or as required by the law or its officers.
- The subscriber must not transfer, sell or share internet access rights, or allow the account to be used by any other person, other than those Melb PC Family Members who are listed on this application and have paid the relevant charges.
- The user's last name must be displayed in all e-mail and news messages. The user's first name or initials may be displayed as desired.
- Commercial traffic, in the form of private messages and advertisements in newsgroups designated for that purpose, is permitted within the bounds of Net etiquette.
- The "Organisation" field in private email or public newsgroup article headers must always be Melbourne PC User Group Australia, the name of the service provider. Any other organisation or business name is permitted only in the four-line (maximum) "signature" text that is optionally inserted at the end of the message or article.
- The "From" field used in email and news messages may be the Melb PC assigned email address, e.g. jones@melbpc.org.au or a "Spam-trap" address, e.g. jones@notspam.org.au or, subject to Clause 22 an external address, e.g. jones@hotmail.com.
- Melb PC may assign its rights and obligations to full Internet Subscribers under this agreement to an Internet access provider that is of equal standard to Melb PC and after notice of assignment is given to the subscriber, this agreement shall have operation as if it had been entered into between the assignee and the subscriber and Melb PC's rights (except for its right to recover any money owed to it immediately before the assignment) and obligations under this agreement shall be at an end. Services to Associate internet Subscribers shall be limited to the period Melb PC is able to provide them from its own resources.
- The parties submit to the law of Victoria, Australia in relation to any interpretation of this agreement, or any dispute arising out of it.
- To the extent permitted by law and except as expressly provided to the contrary in this Agreement, all warranties whether express, implied, statutory or otherwise, relating in any way to the subject matter of this Agreement or to this Agreement generally, are excluded Where legislation implies in this Agreement any condition, or warranty and that legislation avoids or prohibits provisions in a contract excluding or modifying the application of or the exercise of or liability under such term, such term shall be deemed to be included in this Agreement. However, the liability of Melb PC for any breach of such term shall be limited at the option of Melb PC, to any one or more of the following if the breach related to goods, the replacement of the goods or the supply of equivalent goods; the repair of such goods; the payment of the cost of replacing the goods or of acquiring equivalent goods, or the payment of the cost of having the goods repaired; and if the breach relates to services the supplying of the services again; or the payment of the cost of having the services supplied again. To the extent permitted by law and except as expressly provided to the contrary in this Agreement Melb PC shall not be under any liability (contractual, tortious or otherwise) to subscriber in respect of any loss or damage (save for only personal injury and death) howsoever caused, which may be suffered or injured or which may arise directly or indirectly in respect to the supply of goods or services pursuant to this Agreement or the act, failure or omission of Melb PC.
- Accounts may be suspended without notice to stop transmission of network packets that threaten or have the potential to threaten the security or normal operation of any computer or device on the local or wider network. Such packets are categorised solely by the Internet Management Subcommittee. Users of accounts suspended without notice will be advised by telephone or writing within two working days of the nature of the packets originating from their account. Lifting of the suspension will require the registered account holder to provide evidence of confirmed action being taken to prevent further the transmission of such threatening or potentially threatening packets.
- The Description of Service "Internet Access Agreement" and the services as described on this application form constitute the entire agreement between the partner and neither of them relies on any term, condition, warranty, collateral contract, representation or promise not set out in those parts of these forms.

After payment members will be able to download the program suite onto their own computers using their Office 365 login details (the same as they already use for email and other cloud services). As long as the subscription is maintained, members will receive updates and upgrades to the latest version of Office.

Our existing Office 365 Enterprise service provides the 'cloud' versions of some Office applications: Word, Excel, PowerPoint and OneNote. These can be used during a login to Office 365 via the web. They do not include all of the features available on the desktop versions. Office 365 ProPlus provides the full versions of those applications, and others not available at in the cloud at all: Outlook, Publisher and Access.
