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President's Report

Windows 10 Has Arrived

Windows 10 was launched on 29 July and users of earlier versions of Windows (7, 8.1) who had reserved their upgrades started receiving them in the days that followed.

Microsoft's approach to this Windows version is widely viewed as an attempt to overcome the negative reaction to Windows 8. But it also marks a major change in the way versions of Windows are distributed. We are told that this is the last version of Windows. and from now on any upgrading will be incremental and incorporated into routine Windows Updates. The headline change in Windows 10 is the return to a Start Button/ Panel, closer to what we had in Windows 7, but enlarged with some live tiles more in the style of Windows 8. There are less visible changes that should make Windows 10 more robust and secure. Deep down in the system there are new protections against virus attacks; and there is provision for new means of secure login using 'biometric authentication': face, iris or fingerprint recognition — which will require new hardware unless your computer already has a fingerprint sensor or a suitable infrared camera.

I expect that our members keenest to move on to Windows 10 will be those who are

already using Windows 8.1 with Classic Shell (or a similar add-on to provide a more traditional interface). When earlier versions of Windows were launched we were well advised to wait for the first service pack to arrive before switching, so that any bugs or hardware/driver problems could be solved first. Service packs are, apparently, no more; but it would still seem to be a good idea to wait a few weeks if you are able. If you are purchasing new hardware, and wish to enjoy one or another new mode of secure login, then as mentioned above you will need to check that the computer has a suitable IR camera or fingerprint sensor. (It seems likely too that older stock without these facilities will be discounted if there is strong market demand for the new features.)

Watch the Yammer Windows 10 Group for discussion among members, and post your own questions there. A speaker from Microsoft will be talking about Windows 10 to our September monthly meeting. The meeting is on Wednesday, 2 September, so put that into your diaries now.

New Website

We have received good news from the website team. The new website will replace our old website this month. It will incorpo-

rate several improvements over the provisional new website which has been visible for some time. Features will include a new calendar with meeting dates for a full year, and a new page of current Melb PC news (extending the traditional Message of the Day). Much of the content is to be provided by SIGs. This area is still under development as SIG conveners are introduced to the new tools.

There is a new *members only* area requiring login. A single login will give access to all the items available only to members, such as *PC Update*, monthly meeting videos, Committee pages, and the Dial Help listing. The login will be per-member and will be the member's Office 365 username (email address) and password. We expect to grant new accounts to all members who do not currently have the login. Transitional arrangements are being discussed.

Monthly Meetings: short sessions

When we asked members for their ideas for monthly meetings earlier this year, one helpful suggestion was that we have some shorter presentations from members, focused on bite-sized topics. Many examples were offered, such as:

- * my favourite shareware program
- * tips on synchronizing (mail, calendar, contacts) between devices
- * free family tree programs

We trialled this way of arranging a monthly meeting in August with short talks on *Rooting your Android device*, and on *Getting started with Melb PC Yammer*. If you have an idea for a topic that can be presented in ten minutes, or an offer of a topic you'd like to present yourself, please let me know.

We also hope to include more items from members with similar tips and tricks in PC Update. If that is your preference send a message to editorpc@melbpc.org.au.

Rule Changes

Our Secretary **Geoffrey Keenan** has been leading a group which has reviewed Melb PC's rules and recommended some tidying-up. These changes, with Committee approval, will come to our September monthly meeting which will include a *Special General Meeting* to consider and vote on these changes. See Geoffrey's article on page 4.

Our Statement of Purposes

The purposes of the Association are — to conduct on a non profit basis activities to help members use personal computers and other similar and related devices to achieve the following outcomes:

- advancing computer literacy;
- advancing education and the exchange of ideas;
- keeping members up to date on developments in computer and information technology and helping members to exchange information;
- representing members in public debate in areas of interest including law reform proposals;
- engaging with similar organisations; and
- carrying out activities that benefit the Association.

Proposed Rule Changes

Updated 29 July 2015 The following Rule changes have been agreed by the Rules sub-committee.

The Committee recognised that a number of changes are necessary to our Rules, in particular the quorum for General Meetings and the requirement to audit or review our financial records and statements. In addition a number of errors and omissions in the existing Rules were identified during the review process. A sub-committee (chaired by the Secretary) was formed, consisting of three current Committee members and four past Committee members, two of whom are Honorary Life Members. The sub-committee met twice, however most of the work was done via email exchanges.

A Special General Meeting will be held on Wednesday 2 September for a formal vote on these changes. See Page 7

Existing Rule 2 — Purposes

The purposes of the Association are — to conduct on a non profit basis activities to help members use personal computers and other similar and related devices to achieve the following outcomes:

Proposed Rule 2

The purposes of the Association are — to conduct on a non profit basis activities to help members learn and use systems and devices using various technologies, especially computing, software, and communications technology (inc. the Internet and World Wide Web, personal computers and devices), to achieve the following outcomes:

Reason for change: The term personal computers is too restrictive on the technologies which members are now using.

Existing Rule 12 (1) — Annual Subscription and Fee on Joining

At each annual general meeting, the Association must determine the amount of the annual subscription rates for each class of membership;

Proposed Rule 12 (1)

The Association shall determine the amount of the annual subscription rates for each class of membership at a general meeting

Reason for change: The existing rules make it mandatory for us to revisit the subscription rates for all members at every AGM. Clearly we only need to make changes which may typically be every three (or more) years.

Existing Rule 14 (2) — Special Categories of Members

The Committee may determine the terms of membership for student or concessional members. The members of the Association may vary such terms and conditions by ordinary resolution at the next general meeting.

Proposed Rule 14 (2)

The Committee may determine the terms of membership for student or concessional members. The members of the Association

may vary such terms and conditions by ordinary resolution at a general meeting

Reason for change: Same as above.

Proposed Rule 14 (5) — Special Categories of Members

A corporation may in writing appoint two natural persons as its representatives and may replace representatives as required. A representative of a corporation shall have the same rights, duties and obligations as members including the right to appoint a proxy, however only one representative may become a member of the Committee.

Reason for adoption: Corporate membership was dropped when the existing rules were agreed and adopted in 2013. This appears to **have been** an oversight.

Existing Rule 31 (5) (e) — Notice of General Meetings

to appoint an auditor.

Proposed Rule 31 (5) (e)

to appoint an appropriately qualified person to review the financial statements according to the Act.

Reason for change: As we are a Tier 2 organisation we are not required to have our financial accounts audited every year – they need only to be reviewed. Audits are more expensive than reviews, however both provide financial information to members in similar formats. The new words align with the words within the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012 for Tier Two organisations.

Existing Rule 32 (2) — Nominations

An eligible member of the Association may:

- (a) nominate himself or herself; or
- (b) with the member's consent, be nominated by another member provided that they submit their nomination in the Nomination form provided to members with the notice of annual general meeting by the date specified as the closing date in the Nomination form. The Nomination form must be in writing and signed by two members and include the written consent of the nominating member.

Proposed Rule 32 — Nominations (complete revision of section).

- (1) The Association shall hold an election to be conducted by postal vote or appropriately secure electronic vote immediately prior to the annual general meeting for the positions of President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary and eight other Committee members.
- (2) The notice for the election shall stipulate the closing date and time for nominations. Nominations shall be addressed to the Returning Officer.
- (3) An eligible member of the Association shall be nominated by two other members. The nomination must be in writing and be on the nomination form (or copy of it) provided to members with the notice of election and be signed by all three members.

Reason for change: The existing rules allow for self-nomination, and that implies only one other member is needed to second the nomination — a situation we want to avoid.

Existing Rule 37 (2) — Quorum of General meetings

The quorum for a general meeting is the presence (physically, by proxy or as allowed under rule 36) of the lesser of 100 members or 10% of the members entitled to vote.

Proposed Rule 37 (2)

The quorum for a general meeting is the presence (physically, by proxy or as allowed under rule 36) of the greater of 30 members or 2% of the members entitled to vote.

Reason for change: With a declining and aging membership, **fewer** members attend the AGM. In addition we are now video streaming the AGM, so attendances are noticeably dropping.

Existing Rule 37 (3) (b) (1) — Quorum of General meetings

the meeting must be adjourned to a date not more than 21 days after the adjournment; and

Proposed Rule 37 (3) (b) (1)

the meeting must be adjourned to a date not more than 35 days after the adjournment; and

Reason for change: Our intention would be to adjourn a general meeting to the next Monthly Meeting. Mostly 28 days would suffice, however whenever the AGM is on the 1st or 2nd of November the December Monthly Meeting is always 35 days later. This happens about every 5 years, and will occur in 2017.

Existing Rule 52 (4) — Election

Members nominating for positions may submit a statement of 100 words or less to the Returning Officer for publication on the Association's web site

Proposed Rule 52 (4)

Members nominating for positions may submit a statement of 200 words or less to the Returning Officer for publication on the Association's web site

Reason for change: The 100 word limit applied when every statement was published in PC Update. With the statements now being published on the website we can relax the limit a little.

Existing Rule 52 (5) — Election

A member may nominate for election for one officer position as well as a Committee member position.

Proposed Rule 52 (5)

A member may nominate for election for one or more officer position(s) as well as a Committee member position.

This will require changes to 53 (3) ...

53 (3) Votes will be counted on a simple majority basis for each Officer position and each committee position. Votes for officer positions will be counted first in the order President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Vice President. Where a person is elected as an officer and is the nominee in the election for any other office or as an ordinary member of the Committee, the second and any further nomination shall lapse. Votes are not transferable between positions.

Reason for change: The current rules allow only for nomination to a single position.

Monthly Meeting Wed 2 September 2015

At seven o'clock sharp we have our Main presentation of the night; a speaker from Microsoft will talk about Windows 10 and the path down which the company is taking us.

That will be followed at 7.45 by the Special General Meeting where those attending will vote on changes to our Rules. See Geoffrey Keenan's summary on page 4.


This will be followed by a break for refreshments, the raffle draw. president's address and the regular Q&A session.

Editorial

New members might not be aware of the organisation named APCUG. You will see at least one APCUG article in this month's PC Update — it's about a photo contest. Clearly this all needs some explanation.

APCUG is the Association of Personal Computer User Groups. We are one such group and we've been a member of the Association for many years — almost back to when APCUG was formed — and we receive lots of benefits from that membership.

Like Melb PC, APCUG also has a mission statement. Our statement is on page 3 this month, it's known as our Statement of Purposes. The APCUG Mission statement is as follows.

APCUG's mission is to:

- Encourage, promote, and enable communications and the exchange of information among its member groups;
- Assist member groups in the fulfillment of their educational and charitable missions and other activities that support those missions;
- Promote the awareness of the value of user groups to the community and the technology industry; and
- Facilitate communication among member groups, the community and the technology industry.

In order to assist with that task, our contact at APCUG Judy Taylour gathers material from all the user group magazines and newsletters, picks out the best of the bunch and distributes them throughout the membership to the editors of all those same magazines and newsletters. This has been happening ever since Judy started the practice about 12-15 years ago. For some obscure reason they are known as the PUSH articles. Why PUSH? I have no idea... never asked. It might be an acronym, I don't know but clearly the intent is to push that good material around the globe through the many member groups. To spread the knowledge

When you write something for PC Update, you do it on the basis that your knowledge and experience is being shared with other members, "Members helping Members". If your writing is especially topical or entertaining, or current news perhaps, your writing might be shared throughout the User Group world through Judy's system.

We have published PUSH articles from time to time. When producing PC Update as a contractor between 1999 and 2007 I used them occasionally to fill the pages with good reading. I recall when Ian Rankin started producing his version of a newsletter in 2014 he used the PUSH articles much of the time and now that the group can no longer

afford a "magazine" and I'm producing this PC Update newsletter as a volunteer, I'm also keeping my eye on the material that Judy circulates.

The PUSH material is not all we get from APCUG. There are competitions held and one is happening currently, a photographic contest, see page 24. In addition to that there is friendly competition between the Groups. Our PC Update magazine when it was being printed won a good number of prizes in years past, Best Overall Magazine is one that comes to mind. There is also a competition for best Website, and of course, this year a contest at member level, for Digital photography.

In order to keep it fair, groups are separated by size. So, large groups, presumably

with lots of resources, won't be competing against a small group of a few dozen members and so on. Melb PC has always competed with the 'big boys'. In fact, we have always been one of the largest groups.

A few lines back I mentioned the word acronym. It reminded me of the acronym I once used for selecting material for PC Update.

I would write "material must comply with the PC Update IEEE Specifications" otherwise it won't be considered. This caught the eye of many, and some actually asked.

For an article to fall within PC Update's IEEE specifications it had to be, Informative, Enlightening, Educational or Entertaining but preferably all of the above. The IEEE was in jest, of course but it"s amazing how many people do reach those levels.

Random Access

John Swale reports on Questions and Answers from the opening session of the recent monthly meeting and from members' written submissions.



Questions and **Answers**

Q: My wife has just purchased a new HP All-in-one to replace an XP machine. She needs to keep running some XP programs rather than get updated ones for Windows 8. To conserve desk space, can she use the screen of the All-in-one as the monitor for the XP machine?

A: The HP has all the electronics in the one box, so it is probably not possible. You could try using Remote Desktop if you have XP Pro. There is a free version of Virtual Network Control (VNC) that might work if both machines are set up on the same network. There are a few packages that will transfer some XP programs to later versions of Windows.

Q: I was getting a lot of junk mail using Windows Live Mail, so I changed to Thunderbird. The problem is that I'm not getting all the emails coming into Thunderbird even though I continually say they are safe. Do you have any ideas?

A: Check the Thunderbird security settings for anything that might be related to spam. Note that some ISPs classify certain emails as junk. They have to be moved from the Junk folder to the Inbox so Thunderbird can see them.

Q: I have a Toshiba Z830 Ultrabook which occasionally turns the screen off even though I have set the power settings to have the screen stay on.

A: With a laptop it can be a number of things. Many laptops, especially Ultrabooks, have slim printed circuit ribbon cables that link the motherboard to the screen and the repeated opening and closing can break the leads. Have a Toshiba service person look at it as the cables can be replaced if defective. You could check the event viewer (Control Panel | Administrative tools | Computer management | Event viewer) for any hardware error entries (red icon) with a date-time stamp just after the time the screen went blank.

Q: An iPad that cost \$789 two and a half year ago failed at the weekend. Apple Southland said it was a major internal failure that couldn't be repaired and the warranty was only 12 months. I told them that Australian Consumer Law states that for a major failure within a reasonable lifespan we have a choice of a full refund or a replacement. I contacted Apple and they said

Some systems may have difficulties with the new update to Windows 10.

iHelp advises you should not install Win 10 until reports indicate the installation is reliable. This applies particularly if you are operating a critical system, and especially if you don't have a current backup. they have an agreement with the ACCC that the life of an iPad was 2 years. So our consumer rights expired after 2 years. They offered to replace our iPad with the same, now superseded model at a cost of \$369. Our choice therefore is to pay another 50% to get a superseded model or pay \$800 to \$900 for a current model. Any thoughts or suggestions?

A: You could try discussing this problem with the Melb PC Apple SIG or with AUSOM as these groups have more experience with these things. Big companies like Apple can be almost a law unto themselves and do what they like. You are quite right thinking a complete failure just over two and a bit years is not reasonable for a machine that has been well looked after. If it had been a child's iPad that might have been dropped, then the two years might be reasonable.

Mint 17.2 on a laptop which has Win7 Professional with Win XP Professional on a virtual drive already loaded. Linux and Win 7 share common data files.

In July Peter Carpenter took us thru the Office 365 services attached to our Melb PC email address. This lead to some discussion on the security and reliability of the cloud. Dave had requested that we submit our favourite websites. One suggestion was Google Earth, the Pro version, which is now free. The site gives instructions for the download and a licence code. This will be the subject of a future mini-presentation from **Brian Heyward**. Another favourite website featured the striking photos of **Trey-Ratcliff**. He does post-production work on the photos, producing "other-worldly, mind-blowing creations".

Questions & Answers

Q: What are plug-ins, extensions and add-ons?
A: They are applications that add extra functionality to your browser. Adobe Reader and Foxit both supply a plug-in so that the browser can handle PDF files directly. Other Firefox plug-ins are Video Download Helper and Ad-Block Plus. To get Add-ons, you can go to Add-ons in the Firefox menu. Add-ons are also available in the I.E browser. They don't normally incur any risk.

Q: What is Tune-In?

A: When listening to broadcast radio, we are limited to the range of its transmitters. Tuneln is a website (and a phone App) that provides many radio programs via the Internet – thus accessible anywhere the Internet is available. However the traffic will be part of data allowances

and caution is needed. Even better, to use Wi-Fi where larger allowances usually apply.

Note – some phones have FM radio (where the earphones may need to be plugged in to become the aerial) and use the broadcast signal, so does not count against data allowances.

Q: What's the best way to back up a Solid State Drive and the original Hard Drive?

A: The original Hard Drive has 3 partitions. They were C, D, E but are now seemingly E, F, G.

AOMEI Backupper is a new free offering – and suggested method would be to backup the whole SSD, then each other partition separately. As well, it will give a picture of the drives – essential to understand before deleting unwanted / duplicated stuff.

It does back-ups, restores, clones and has several utilities. It will back up partitions, system data etc. and has had many good reviews.

The July meeting commenced with **Frank Maher** welcoming all members again in the absence of **Paul Woolard** our regular mc who is enjoying a sunny break up north.

The first session commenced with Q&A with **George Skarbek**. After a long pause, a question was finally asked which then lead to many others.

Q: Often when a USB stick is inserted into a USB slot on my desktop PC, the computer does not recognise it. If another memory stick is inserted into the same port it is recognised. Do you have any thoughts why this happens?

A: George said he's had the same problem when inserting some USB sticks into the front USB ports of his PC. The solution is to insert the USB stick into the rear slots, as these slots come directly off the motherboard and always work for him. George uses a USB extension cable from the rear to connect to a rear USB port.

Q: As Office 2013 with Outlook costs \$239, would it be better to go with Office 365 instead?

A: There is no definitive answer. Some thought are: Older versions of Office will be just as practical as the latest version if you already have a copy. Why not consider a free alternative to Outlook in Thunderbird, Gmail or Windows Live Mail. Your MelbPC account will give you free access to Office 365 rather than paying \$70 yearly for Office365 or buying Office 2013 outright. Office 2016 is due soon, so if you must have the latest wait for that to arrive.

Q: I use a 1 year old USB3 hard drive for backups. When plugged into a USB3 slot I get a message that "this device will work faster ...". Is there anything faster than USB3?

A: This is a surprising message as USB3 is the fastest USB interface. Are you using the correct USB slot coloured blue? Just because your hard drive has a USB3 interface, doesn't mean it will work at a higher rate than the controller and the electronics allow. Some devices are being advertised as having an USB3 interface as a key selling point but won't go any faster than USB2.

Q: After a recent problem with smoke alarms going off at home, the voltage was checked and found to be 252 volts. Can my PC handle this?

A: The PC should be able to handle 252 volts. The problem comes at 260 to 265 and will affect florescent lights first. I wouldn't worry about 252 volts.

Q: I had a virus called "Tapsnake" on my PC that's now been removed, but a program called Sophos antivirus appeared at the time. Is Sophos a genuine antivirus program?

A: Sophos is an Australian antivirus program. However that doesn't stop someone calling itself by the name of a legitimate antivirus program.

Q: My daughter has a second-hand laptop that came with Windows 7 Home. She wants to load Windows 7 Ultimate but when trying to format the drive, Windows

said the drive cannot be found. The hard disk is not the original but a SSD so could this be the cause?

A: The question is why do you need Ultimate as it offers very little to the home user. As for the hard drive you can't just use format C as Windows self-defence will prevent this. You need to format the drive from DOS.

In our next session **Trevor Hudson** played another of his instructional videos titled "How to download videos using aTube Catcher". As the title suggests Trevor's video shows how to install and run aTube Catcher to download videos from the internet. The software used is available at www.aTube.me. Trevor's video can be found on YouTube by searching the title above.

Next up was **Dave Botherway**. Dave's presentation compared a selection of the latest mini PCs, PCs on a stick or Stick PCs as they have become known. These devices run Windows (or Linux) and when inserted into the HDMI connection on a TV can turn that TV into a Smart TV. A Smart TV is defined as a TV that can connect to the internet. These Stick PCs are the next generation of devices after Google Chromecast or Measy, both of which have been the subject of earlier presentations.

The whole PowerPoint presentation was completed using the MeegoPad operated by a wireless keyboard and mouse. As far as the audience was concerned the presentation using the MeegoPad was no different to other presentations using a notebook PCs connected to the same projector. Summary of this presentation is included elsewhere in PCUpdate.

After the break **Dave Botherway** demonstrated the latest preview version of Windows 10.

April meeting report by Paul Addis

Once again, **Nick Vespo** provided a Linux News video. This month it was an abridged version of a presentation by **Chris Anderson** who is the founder of a user community named "DIY Drones". Chris is of the opinion that 2007 was the "year of change" for drones and similar devices enabled by advances in the state of hardware, with dividends from smartphones, wearable devices and robotics. The hardware is moving towards open source.

Open innovation has many advantages, including the ability for many people to work in parallel, even when they are geographically dispersed. In terms of development and competition, Chris traced the change over recent time:

- * 20th Century company versus company;
- * Later product versus product;
- * Latest ecosystem versus ecosystem.

The latest scenario seems to offer more opportunity for open-source development, both of hardware and software. The DIY Drones community looks to be thriving, with fixed wing and rotary wing air vehicles, plus ground and water based drones all being discussed and under development.

The Q and A session was dominated by a single question: Can you recommend Virtual Private Network (VPN)?

This stimulated much discussion, including about the relative merits of VPNs and proxy servers. One of the points of issue being whether the VPN provider can be trusted not to have been compromised by a security service, e.g. CIA or NSA or ASIO. The major need seems to be for access to geographically blocked services, such as the ability to download videos from North America.

There was no clear conclusion, but the discussion was enlightening, with contributions from a number of people.

After the social break and a cup of a brew that refreshes came the main presentation of the evening. This was

given by **Alan Oates**, and the topic was Integrated Development Environments (IDEs).

Alan's view is that an IDE needs three major components:

- A good quality text editor. In this context, Alan looks for an editor with columnar editing ability;
- A compiler (handling the source language chosen by the user);
- The ability to run the resulting program with debugging facilities active.

He described Microsoft's Visual Studio as "the grand-daddy of IDEs" - speculation as to whether that was because of age or ability was left to the audience. It was not further described because it is Windows only and rather high cost.

There are free competitive products, including Eclipse and NetBeans. They are multi-platform, being based on Java, and can therefore run on most Linux distributions.

There are numerous books and publications about IDEs. Alan considers Eclipse the most important of the "free" IDE's. There are literally hundreds of demonstrations and tutorials about Eclipse on Youtube, as well as numerous printed books if a prospective user wants to learn about it before taking the plunge.

Alan recommended avoiding the usual linux repository based install, and instead download and install the latest versions from the Eclipse website (eclipse.org). To install and use Eclipse, you will first have to check that the required Java Runtime Environment (JRE) package is installed. Then the desired version of Eclipse can be downloaded and installed. The download size varies from less than 150MB to almost 300MB.

Eclipse supports development for a number of languages, including Java (naturally), C, C++, Python, PHP, Fortran and UPC, as well as frameworks such as Eclipse/Scout. The current version is Eclipse Luna (4.4).

Alan uses Eclipse for Fortran development, and had to add the Fortran feature to the basic package. The basic installation process is fairly straightforward, starting with unpacking the downloaded file. Going from the Welcome prompt to Install New Software. To add a feature, it should be downloaded and installed via Help > Install New Software.

The big advantage of Eclipse is its versatility and its multi-platform basis. Of course, apps for Android can be created via Eclipse.

For those wanting to pursue the use of Eclipse, Norm Krumpe's tutorial, found at

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=23tAK5zdQ9c could be a useful place to start, although it is only one of many. The members present applauded Alan's presentation and wished him well, since he was due fly to the Northern Hemisphere a few days after the meeting.

The Windows PLUS meeting has two workshops and a General session for common items including the "Plus" items. The format for each workshop is :- queries, members' problems, alerts, tips, techniques, interesting programs/apps, useful sites and presentations.

Windows 7 Workshop

The session continued to explore Windows 7. Member problems were discussed and resolved.

- 1. What was the diagnostic tool previously mentioned? Windows Update Troubleshooter. One useful resource is the Microsoft Fixit Centre https://support2.microsoft.com/fixit/ for all sorts of Microsoft software.
- 2. When given a link in a search or email that you are not sure is genuine, drag it onto the Kaspersky icon for an assessment.
- 3. A Chrome PC running Avast was changed to use Microsoft Security Essentials. Internet Explorer was lost and all links to it went to the Chrome browser. Some research suggested it was a Browser Reassignment virus but MSE did not detect anything.

As Internet Explorer is a system component it was suggested that running the System File Checker might help. For those still waiting to convert from XP there is a program VirtualXP Free to make a virtual machine image of your XP machine so it can be run in a virtual machine (eg VirtualBox) under Windows 7 or 8.

General Windows Discussion

The second morning session covered areas common to all Windows versions including the "Plus" topics.

Office 365 was discussed including current issues and there was a brief introduction to the other components such as Sharepoint and Yammer. These will be investigated in future meetings with a OneNote presentation scheduled for the August meeting.

The list of topics for future meetings was updated to include RSS feeds, maintenance and repair (physical, software and files) and how to ensure that link you have been given is safe to click.

Windows 8 Workshop

This session followed the same structure as Windows 7 but covered Windows 8 and 8.1.

There was a presentation on the different ways to log onto a Windows 8 PC. This included a discussion on the difficulty of using each one and level of security provided.

The next meeting will continue with the two workshops. The General session will further examine Office 365 with a presentation on OneNote. The SIG email address is still win78@melbpc.org.au.

Our New Website — A Preview

This page is designed to show members how the existing 'new website' appears to-day. Work is almost complete and we hope to go live within 10-14 days of this newsletter's publication. Serious testing with committee members and SIG leaders will commence as of now.

The backbone of the site has been growing for almost a year as many SIG leaders added their material into the Umbraco system that sat beside the old website, but until recently we had no suitable 'front page'. Member **Craig Mattson** has been working on the solution to that.

The website is located on our own Melb PC servers in the basement at Moorabbin and we uitilise the Group's Office365 membership for secure logins. When you login to access member material you must have a Melb PC email address.

From the Main Screen you select the Members Only Menu. That provides a number of options including entry to the Office 365 Portal, to Yammer, to download the current newsletter and to any other members only material that is available from time to time, as per this sample.




Figure 1. (sample) Members Only Menu.




Figure 2. The Members Only login page.




Figure 3. The Azure login screen.

Once you select any of the members only options you are placed on the appropriate page with a warning that you need a Melb PC email address to gain access. If you don't have a current email address you must phone the office to make that arrangement. Otherwise you simply click on the "Login with Office 365 text box. That opens the Azure login screen — Figure 3.

The Azure Login will be familiar to those members who use the Office 365 facility; Yammer, OneDrive and so forth. Here you simply enter your MelbPC email address and password and you pass through accordingly. If you came here to visit Yammer, you will land on the Yammer page. If you came here simply to access a members only feature of our local website, your secure authorisation is received and you are sent straight into that local page. In the test I came here to download a newsletter and the system landed me onto that page (see Figure 4). I am still on the local website but my authorisation was gained from the secure Office 365 login.

You will see it has my name and member number on the screen. When ever you log in to the members only area, you remain logged in until you close your browser or shut down the Melb PC Website.
